School Reports Home Today - Today mid year reports are sent home. These report are in relation to Reading/Pānui, Writing/Tuhituhi, Mathematics/Pangarau and the Key Competencies (Original and Montessori) or Graduate Profile (Māori Immersion). We are required to report in writing to parents twice a year, in relation to the National Standards. We have deliberately used language in the summary assessment that is focussed on the progress journey each child is making. We avoid using the terms "below" and "well below" in the reports parents share with their children. However, the report will tell you whether your child is working above the standard/whanaketanga, working at the standard/whanaketanga, is not yet at the standard (ie - is below the standard) and is working towards it, or if your child requires more significant support to work toward the standard (ie, is working well below the standard.)

At this stage of the year we are mostly assessing where each child is working in relation to the standard. The end of year report is focussed on their final achievement in relation to the standard.

Matariki Food Donations - Every year we collect food for the City Mission to help "keep the storehouses full" through the winter months. This week we hope to have the food delivered to the City Mission. If you have not already done so then please consider donating a non perishable item before Thursday.

Maths Results – Original and Montessori Strands: Recently I reported to the Board about the recent Progress and Achievement Test in Mathematics and what these tests indicated in relation to The National Standards. Key information from this report is as follows:

There were 96 students tested - 47 girls and 49 boys. A quick Summary of Results:

- Results indicate "above" the standard: 52%
- Results indicate "at" the standard: 30%
- Results indicate "below" the standard: 14%
- Results indicate "well below" the standard: 4%

Girls and Boys - Something to Highlight!

One of the most encouraging results is the raising of girls achievement in this area. In 2014 this was identified as an area for development, when 43% of boys achieved stanine 7, 8 or 9 (likely above) compared to 29% girls. This year 52% of girls achieved at this level compared to 50% of boys. Therefore these results indicate there is no longer a gender discrepancy in relation to mathematics achievement.

Teachers know the children who are in need of learning support in the area of Mathematics. These children's needs are known to their teachers who are endeavouring to meet them through the classroom programme, which incorporate online programmes and targeted group tuition. Overall the results indicate that these programmes are preparing children well for ongoing mathematics learning.

The full Board report is available from Clifford. Mathematics achievement in The Māori Immersion Strand will be reported on next term.

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Message from the Board of Trustees

Hi

As you are no doubt aware the recent school trustee elections passed quietly at Otari School as there were only six parents who were nominated for the six available positions. We thought it important to introduce ourselves to you so that you can learn a bit more about your school trustees. To that end I have asked all the trustees to give a brief bio of themselves and we have included a photo taken at our board meeting last week.

The Board has the overall responsibility for the school. The relevant legislation states that the Board's most important responsibility is student achievement. To achieve this, the Board is also legally responsible for the curriculum (what is taught), property, personnel, finance and health and safety.

I thought it would be useful for the Board to provide a short update following our meetings. This way you can see what we are doing to discharge our responsibilities. At the first meeting of the new board we invited Alison Dyer our accounts provider to outline our funding and budgeting requirements, we received and discussed Clifford's Principal's Report which included a report on maths achievement for the Years 4 through to Year 8 students. We also heard from a group of parents from the Immersion Strand who are looking at strategies to increase enrolment in that strand. One thing we would really like help with is grant applications. As you know from the information provided by Clifford we rely on parent donations to assist with funding at our school. This still leaves us wanting so we would love it if a parent or group of parents would work with the Board to access grant funding.
