Kia ora koutou

20 years ago this week... Twenty years ago this week I began my tenure as principal of Otari School. As many of you know, I was surprised at the end of last term by the children and staff with a special hui to celebrate this. Yesterday I shouted the staff morning tea and we had an extra long break time to mark the anniversary of my first powhiri at Otari School when our whānau was welcomed on Monday 15 July, 2002. I spoke yesterday about that first powhiri and how much it meant to our family. We were a grieving family of 6 having suddenly lost our nearly 9 year old daughter, Evangeline, exactly one month before (from a flu virus that, for some reason, overwhelmed her.) Despite the sadness we felt, the welcome we received and the words spoken at that first powhiri provided a reassurance that we had been brought to the right place. We have never forgotten the aroha of that powhiri or the way it truly made us feel we belonged here. I knew Otari School was a special place then and I know it still, 20 years later.

When we arrived the school had 150 students and there were 6 classrooms. Claire Rumble was the chairperson of the Board of Trustees, which also included Alison Dyer and Susan West. Susan, Jillian, Britta, Lynette and Katrina were all on the staff. The administration block was being built and I was temporarily accommodated in a small room situated where the current library is. Since then there have been many changes and developments in relation to curriculum, ministry priorities and property, including 3 more classrooms due to a 30% roll increase. Like all schools we have been subject to the never ending initiatives and changing priorities of the government and Ministry of Education. I have been very fortunate to have worked with a continuously dedicated and engaged board of trustees and have also had the pleasure of working with a succession of effective, skilled board chairs.

I have been asked many times about the challenge of leading a school that is comprised of three communities. "How does it all work?" is a common question. I always reply that it works because we all see the bigger picture and know that as well as fostering the unique and special features of each strand we are united in our value of whānaungatanga and in our commitment to developing the whole child as expressed in our vision. Our unique structure works because we value the contribution each strand makes to the whole school and we do deliberate things that foster each stand and that foster school unity. We are about to enter a period of reflection and renewal and I look forward with interest, along with the board, to hearing from the community as we review our priorities, values and vision.

I have learnt a lot over the past twenty years in many different areas. I've tried new things, implemented change, made mistakes, developed new skills, met challenges I thought would overwhelm me and learnt the true meaning of virtues like flexibility, detachment and fortitude! I've worked with amazing, talented people and enjoyed productive and rewarding relationships with students, staff and parents. One of the messages inside a class card that I received said "20 years?! Holy crap that's a long time!" (I love the no holds barred honesty of children!) They are right, it is a long time but as the old saying goes, "time flies when you're having fun" and I look forward to my 21st year and all that lies ahead.



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Matika - An eight-week bereavement support programme for tamariki

We are delighted to announce that places are now open for Matika, Skylight's new psychoeducational group programme for bereaved children.

Matika provides an opportunity for children who have experienced the death of someone close to them, to connect with others in their own age group who are experiencing a similar loss.

Together the children learn about the big emotions of grief, ways to cope with the loss, and ways they can continue to feel close to the person who has died. The programme is run by trained facilitators who guide the children through a range of age-appropriate activities.

Each group meets weekly, for eight weeks.
