Picnic at Scorching Bay Cancelled - With the endless summer we have been enjoying it is hard to believe we picked one of the rainiest weeks for a picnic! Scorching it will not be if we went tomorrow! We have decided to actually cancel the Scorching Bay picnic due to the many other activities on our school radar. However, all is not lost - we will have a school picnic later in the term at Aotea Lagoon. We have picked Thursday 29 March for this (the day before Good Friday).

ERO Review - ERO visited the school last week. They reviewed the governance, management, teaching and learning. A particular focus was on how well the school is catering for 'priority learners' - those students who need extra support to reach the expected curriculum levels. The Board received positive feedback about many of the areas reveiwed and also areas for further development. A draft report will be provided in about four weeks, then the Board has an opportunity to respond. After this the report is made public.

The Board was happy for ERO to meet with parents, however this was not part of their review process this time. They met with the Board to begin the review. ERO also met with all the teachers for a session on assessment, appraisal and well being. They spent considerable time talking to me. A lot of time was also spent on analysing and reviewing documentation. ERO did spend a short time in classrooms and spoke to some children.

Complaints Process - The Board have revised the complaints process. This will be on our school website and visible in the office reception area by the end of this week.

Children After School - Children are welcome to stay after school and play **if their parents are at the school too**. Otherwise they must go home or be in after school care. We have had to talk to a few children who have been in the school grounds unsupervised, after school. There are two options at Otari School, our own Otari After School Care and Pridelands After School Care.

Festivals and Celebrations: Chinese New Year -



At this time of year we often have students learning about and celebrating Chinese New Year. The start of the lunar year begins in February, and millions of people across the world have been gathering with family, getting out the firecrackers and celebating the Chinese New Year.

February 16 denoted the beginning of the Year of the Dog, defined by the Chinese zodiac cycle. The day is traditionally marked with the giving of gifts and celebrations with family, as well as looking to what the sign of the Dog will mean for the year ahead. Celebrations will last until March 2nd - about 15 days in total - making this the longest holiday in the Chinese calendar, with one sixth of the world celebrating it. It is also the largest annual use of fireworks on the planet! Guo Nian Haoi! - Pass the New Year well!
