Kia ora koutou

Welcome to a new child and his family: Makahapo Agi Morizono (Totara).

The children enjoyed another "Science Week" last week, participating in a range of science experiments and activities. Science learning has continued this week as students are treated to more fascinating science learning from Jacqui Horswell and her team from The Institute of Environmental Research.

Current class sizes, future class sizes and managing our roll - Thanks to the school enrolment scheme the school is able to manage the roll and the effects of this will start to be seen next year in the junior school. However, currently the Original and Montessori strands have large classes and it will be quite a few years before our large middle and senior classes become smaller. In fact, over the next few years there will continue to be large classes in Totara, Kereru, Ngaio and Pohutukawa. This is not due to any mismanagement of the school roll. We were not able to turn anyone away until the zone came into effect in 2012, and even then the Board kept families together, believing (rightly) it was better to have siblings stay at the school, especially for those families who started children when there was no zone in place. Therefore, it has taken time for the effects of zoning to become visible and it will continue to be some time before the effects are felt in the middle and senior school.

As Principal, I try and allocate staffing and teaching spaces available to ensure children are well catered for. It is important that everyone understands the limitations the Principal and the Board operate within when managing the roll. The Ministry of Education allocate a particular number of teachers to the school based on a formula. This formula does not take into account the fact we have three strands. In most schools you would not have a senior class in one strand with 35 children and a senior class in another strand with 20 children, however, unlike most schools, we are limited in our ability to spread our students around due to our three strand structure.

The Ministry allow us to separately manage a special programme (Māori Immersion), however we are not permitted to only advertise spaces in Montessori or Original, and if one strand is full we must provide a place for any in-zone students who arrive, regardless of their strand preference, and also offer any available place within either strand to out of zone students selected through ballot, regardless of their strand preference.

Therefore, if a space becomes available in the Montessori strand and an out of zone Original strand seeking parent is next on the list, they are offered this place. These are the rules.

The large classes are due to our school roll increasing during a time when we had to enrol every child who wanted to come to our school. Between 2002 and 2012 our roll increased from approximately 150 to 230. This was due to more and more people wanting to come to our school. The latest round of applications for enrolment at Otari School show that there is still a significant amount of families living outside the zone who would like their children to start at Otari School. Meanwhile, there has been an increase in people moving into the zone to come to Otari School.

All of this does present challenges, however they are challenges we are addressing as well as we can. For a while, some teachers will continue to manage large classes and we will continue to provide enough space and teaching support to enable teaching programmes to be effectively implemented. While acknowledging all concerns about large classes, I am thankful we do not have the opposite problem of a drastically falling roll and a loss of staff. Our burgeoning roll indicates we are doing something right!

If we don't get enough enrolments in any strand, the staffing and funding is threatened. This is why, while we are potentially looking at having waiting lists in the Montessori and Original strands, in the Māori Immersion strand we are hoping to maintain the roll and attract more students this year, to ensure numbers stay healthy and maintain the three classes and staffing.

Managing a roll in any school is a challenge. At Otari School there are particular features that can make operating within the Ministry of Education legislation a somewhat stress inducing task!
